Controlling Weeds

Nothing ruins a lawn like weeds. Sometimes, pulling weeds out by the roots is enough to control them. But if that doesn't work, you may need to use a weed killer. In that case, consider the following pointers in your plan of attack:

- Tip 1: Follow the instructions on the weed killer product carefully.
- Tip 2: Don't spread a weed killer on a newly seeded lawn—it may do more harm than good.
- Tip 3: If you spray on a weed killer with a garden-hose attachment, wait for a calm day with little or no wind to prevent it from spreading to adjoining flower patches and harming them.
- Tip 4: If you mow weekly, spray weed killer in the middle of that cycle so that the chemical can sink into the weeds and do its work undisturbed.
